




LANGUAGE OUTSIDE YOUR CLASSROOM MATTERS

Address the use of disability slurs inside and outside the lesson to create a safe environment for all students.







ABLEISM

A system that places value on people's bodies and minds based on societally constructed ideas of normalcy, intelligence, excellence, and productivity. These constructed ideas are deeply rooted in anti-Blackness, eugenics, colonialism, and capitalism.

This form of systemic oppression leads to people and society determining who is valuable and worthy based on a person's appearance and/or their ability to satisfactorily (re)produce, excel, and "behave."

You do not have to be disabled to experience ableism.

Amplify disabled voices, especially those of the global majority. If they aren't in your spaces, invite them.





Adopt universal design teaching strategies (e.g. alt-text, captions, descriptions) and center disabled experiences.





Disabled people face inequities because the system was never intended for us to succeed. Help dismantle ableism through advocacy.



Pass the microphone

Do your own work to unlearn ableism

Read, think, question, and practice allyship. Don't accept excuses for inaccessibility and bias.

Incorporate anti-ableism in training.

Advocacy is an obligation.

Disability justice holds potential to lead our anti-ableist and anti-racist efforts. It must be led by people of color with disabilities.


ABLEISM:


The assumption that the "standard" or "normal" able-body is in and of itself better than nonstandard or abnormal forms and the discrimination and oppression that results from this assumption.


STRUCTURAL ABLEISM:


The systems, practices, institutions, and habits that assume ablebodiedness, resulting in the exclusion and stigmatization of disabled people.



Ableism and Experience

Ableism fools us into thinking that disability is experienced similarly: as negative.

The ableist conflation: the assumption that disability comes along with pain and suffering.
